### **Artsmark Silver Award**

We are thrilled to announce that Rye Hills Academy has been awarded the Artsmark Silver Award in recognition of our fantastic arts provision.

The Artsmark Award is the only creative quality standard for schools, accredited by Arts Council England.

In order to achieve our Artsmark Award, we had to develop our arts and culture provision to embed a broad and ambitious curriculum. This was achieved by creating an overall plan that was committed to and delivered across the whole school.

We were supported by Culture Bridge North East in planning and developing our objectives, who worked alongside the school at various stages to support us with our Artsmark Award achievement.

The Artsmark assessor said:

"You are positively increasing the emphasis on arts and culture and engaging with the Arts is having tangible results on pupils, staff, and parental engagement.

"The school has worked hard

to deliver a consistent approach to arts throughout the curriculum, including the Culture Vulture

programme which has shown a noticeable rise in uptake of arts subjects at Key Stage 4 and has also seen students produce some outstanding creative homework.

## Summer traditions in the UK and around the world...

**UK Wimbledon:** is the oldest and arguably the most famous tennis tournament to exist. The tournament made history in 1967 to be the first broadcast to be televised in colour! Did you know that Wimbledon is the only remaining 'grand slam' to be played on actual grass?

**UK Cheese rolling**: Have you heard of the annual Gloucester Cheese Rolling event? People gather in their thousands to watch as competitors chase gigantic rolls of Gloucester cheese down some very bumpy hills!

**Spain:** La **Tomatina:** On the last Wednesday of every August, over 20,000 people gather in Buñol, Spain, to celebrate La Tomatina. Hundreds of tomatoes are thrown at each other in the street just for the fun of it. The tradition began in 1945 and approximately 40 metric tonnes of tomatoes are used – that's a lot of tomatoes!

**Japan: Aomori Nebuta Matsuri Festival:** During August, vibrant lanterns showing gods and mythical characters are paraded through the streets of Japan as drummers and dancers bring the parade to life!

### **Culture Vultures**

Our Culture Vulture extra curricular tasks were back this term with a coronation theme.

We challenged students to choose and complete a range of tasks including researching coronations, writing a poem or letter imagining they were at the coronation, creating a crown and researching a commonwealth country.
